ALL GRADES & FAMILIES

Each month, a different grade participated in a drive for Catholic Charities Housing Transitions Program. We had a tremendous support from students and families who donated snacks and toiletries in paper bags decorated with drawings and encouraging messages. Everyone went above and beyond!

PRE-K: SUNSHINE PROJECT

These young students spread happiness and good wishes by creating cards and mailing them to school and parish staff.

KINDERGARTEN: OUR NEIGHBORHOOD COMMUNITY

Kindergarten brought joy to many this year. They created placemats for Portland VA Medical Center patients for Veteran's Day, made valentines for Laurelhurst Village residents, and delivered flower bouquets to All Saints neighbors.

1ST GRADE: ART FOR THE HEART

1st graders and their families donated 12 bags of art supplies to Randall Children's Hospital this year. The students also had a lot of sweet prayers for children at Randall's after their talk with the guest speaker from the hospital. Art provided a bright spot for patients who had few visitors and activities due to COVID-19 risks.



2ND GRADE: BOOKS BUILD BRIDGES

Second grade held an ALL-SCHOOL BOOK DRIVE to benefit **The Children's Book Bank** to improve early literacy. With the help of the All Saints community, they collected 2,300 children's books in the hopes that more kids will have access to bedtime stories and can learn to read. They also used their creative skills to create book marks with artwork and messages about love for reading and books!





4TH GRADE: FEEDING THE HUNGRY

In Fall, the 4th graders supported Friends of the Children Portland with 200 fun, decorated snack packs for kids in their program who often experience food instability, especially during the pandemic.

In Spring, students collected over 700 individual snacks for New Avenues for Youth, an organization that helps young people working through issues of homelessness.

7TH GRADE: CALLED TO DISCIPLESHIP

The seventh grade students participate in self-directed community projects throughout Lent to Service Sunday. And during distance learning and a pandemic, these students achieved a lot - 230 total hours worked, as well as donations and collections!
